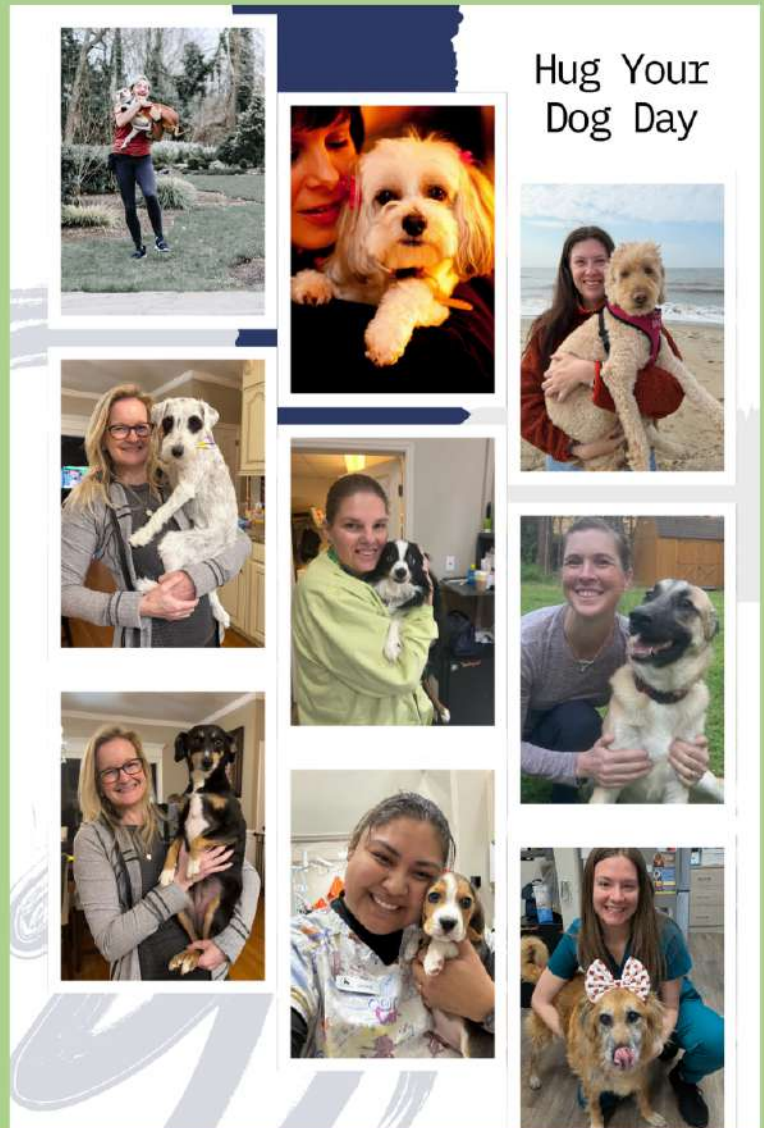


CELEBRATE YOUR PETS THIS APRIL!

CASE OF THE MONTH: BOTH MEDICAL MANIPULATION AND ACUPUNCTURE ARE AVAILABLE ON WEDNESDAY MORNINGS AT CENTRAL PROVIDENCE!

Kingston, a 4-year-old Miniature Australian Shepherd, came to see us after his family noticed he was hunched, stiff, and uncomfortable following a bout of rough play at home. He was hesitant to jump and showed clear signs of lower back pain when touched.

On examination, we found mild to moderate discomfort in his lower back with muscle tension, but reassuringly, his neurological exam was normal with no weakness or coordination issues. His signs were most consistent with an acute musculoskeletal strain rather than a more serious spinal condition.

To help Kingston feel better quickly, we implemented a multimodal treatment plan. This included gentle veterinary medical manipulation (similar to chiropractic care in people) to restore normal joint movement, along with anti-inflammatory support and a short period of activity restriction. At home, his family focused on controlled walks, soft bedding, and close monitoring. ***Keep reading to see how he responded!***

CASE OF THE MONTH CONT'D:

The results were immediate and rewarding—Kingston showed noticeable improvement right after treatment. Over the next several days, his pain resolved, his mobility returned, and he was back to his happy, playful self.



Medical manipulation therapy can be a great option not only for treating pain like Kingston's, but also as part of a preventative care plan for active pets. When used appropriately, treatments are typically spaced out and tailored to each patient's needs.
